Maia Duerr, Executive Director of the Buddhist Peace Fellowship, will present Mandala of Socially Engaged Buddhism.

Rev. KC DaiKai WarEagle will present Overcoming Destructive Emotions: The Path to Equanimity.

Julie Thomas, a professor of psychology, will lead a movement workshop on sacred dance, integrating body, speech and mind through dance and chanting.

Kathi Lieb, Guild Certified Feldenkrais Practitioner (cm), will present The Embodied Moment: Deepening our Practice Through Body Awareness.

Beata Grant, professor at George Washington University will read and discuss the poetry, sermons, and other writings of Buddhist nuns and laywomen of 16th -20th Century China, based on her book, Daughters of Emptiness.

Agness Au, a New York City based senior Shambhala Buddhist teacher, will lead a workshop on the expression of the union of masculine and feminine principles.
